Art: The Private View of the Art Exhibition once again provided the opportunity to showcase work of extraordinary quality to an appreciative audience. The diversity, originality and standard of art was notable; the presence of the artists provided further insight into their work.

Charity: A significant number of Sixth Form boys and staff participated in the 2015 Charity Bike Ride from Southwater Country Park and back, a total of 43 miles off-road via the Down's Link.

Economics: Over 200 students from 13 schools attended the annual Economics Speakers' Day where four speakers introduced the audience to topical, economic concepts beyond the confines of the syllabus.

Politics: James Sweetland (L6) was one of three winners in the inaugural Orwell Youth Prize with his essay entitled *Tribunal fees are a silent bedroom tax*.

Music: The last fortnight has witnessed musical performances of extraordinary diversity and talent. A first for the RGS saw the opera *The Judgement of Paris* performed in the courtyard of the Old Building: atmospheric, powerful and intimate, it was a great success. British summertime, however, stayed true to form and the second night did not enjoy such clement conditions! The Charity Bands Concert, then, provided the forum for music from the Concert Band, the Nick Edwards Clarinet Quartet, Roshan Patel and the Big Band. Music ranged from *Eye of the Tiger* and *Crocodile Rock* to *Porgy and Bess* and *Hits of the 60s*. The RGS String Scheme gave a very well received concert at St Peter's School and finally, those privileged enough to be in attendance at Michael Lan's Piano Recital enjoyed an evening of astonishing depth and talent. A programme of stunning complexity included pieces from Bach, Beethoven, Liszt, Ravel and Rachmaninov. The long and heart-felt applause and ovation at the end confirmed that the RGS had experienced one of the finest RGS musicians of recent times.

Athletics: An excellent Sports Day resulted in a narrow victory for Beckingham House. One school record was equalled as **George Eves** (4H) ran the 100 metres in 11.2 seconds. On an individual level, **Gus Cockle** (U6) has received a call-up from British athletics; he has been selected to run for Great Britain at the European Championships in Sweden next month, running the 5,000 metres.

Cricket: In the block fixture against Portsmouth Grammar School, the RGS recorded eight wins including victory for the 1st XI where a nine wicket victory included 78* by **Alexander Sweet** (L6). Other stand-out performances included 128*by **Edward Ferguson** (3S) for the Under 14Bs and bowling figures of 5 for 8 by **James Blackburn** (3S) for the Under 14As. Rain impacted upon the fixtures against Cranleigh School with four cancellations and abandonments. The Under 13s, however, enjoyed a good day with two wins against Wilson's School.

Hockey: Edward Way (L6) was selected for the Under 18 England hockey team against Scotland.

Ice Hockey: William Lawson (1E) has been invited by the English Ice Hockey Association to attend the England Under 14 National Team Training Camp.

Sailing: The sailing team of **Patrick Croghan** (5B), **James Dickinson** (4B), **Nicholas Forbes** (4H), **Max Male** (4A), **Oliver Perkins** (2E) and **Mark Thornton** (L6) had a fantastic day of racing at the Southerns finishing fourth out of 25 teams, and only just denied third position.

Tennis: The U19 tennis team beat Epsom College 5 - 0 in the semi-final but then lost to St George's College in the final of the Rootham Shield.

Weightlifting: Christopher Murray (5V) has been selected to represent England at the Commonwealth Games in September, taking part in Olympic Weightlifting.
