

ACADEMIC REPORT

Academic development is much broader than grades and percentages in public examinations. RGS boys have nurtured and pursued their interests in a number of ways, including participating independently in a number of national and international competitions and events with notable success over the last twelve months.

phenomena success in the Mathematics and Science Challenges and Olympiads. In the Senior Mathematics Challenge, top scorers were Joshua Cudby and Cameron Gibson. In the British Physics Olympiad Callum Spencer and Thomas Spackman were both awarded Top Gold, reserved for the leading 50 applicants in the country; in the Cambridge Chemistry Challenge Joshua Cudby was one of the top 55 students out of 3,010 participants and won a Roentgenium Award. Jack Xia was invited to the Cambridge Training Camp as a result of his Roentgenium Award. In the UK Chemistry Olympiad competition Adam Wills set a new school record for the highest mark achieved by a Lower Sixth Former.

CREST Awards: A school record of 18 students were awarded their CREST Gold Awards for projects ranging from Safeguarding Sea Bass Populations Soft Matter Physics and the Synthesis of Organometallic Compounds Rory Hyatt and Oliver Platt advanced to the final of the prestigious Big Bang UK Young Scientists and Engineers Competition. This is the sixth consecutive year that RGS students have reached the final.

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Design and Technology: Edmund Milton-Seall won a prestigious
Arkwright Design Technology Scholarship and will be sponsored for
the next two years by The Kobler Trust. Luke Kelly's innovative and
professional design for a floor lamp received the award from The Furniture
Makers' Company in The Schools Design Prize.

Engineering: In the Big Bang UK Young Scientists and Engineers
Competition the RGS team won the IMechE Award for Engineering Design
for their project, Remote Sensing of Hot-Tapping Incidents.

Enterprise: Team Evivo gained first place for their innovative and forward-thinking keyless lock in the business project final at Somerset House. RGS Young Enterprise company GoBillou swept the board of awards with their multi-lingual cookbook. Having been crowned West Surrey Company of the Year and also Best Trade Stand, they then won the title of Best Surrey Business and Business Most Likely to Succeed. They then progressed to the Young Enterprise Regional Finals, where GoBillou won Best Advert to advance to the National Finals.

Essay competitions: In the Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge
University competitions, Matthew Leslie won the prestigious Land
Economy essay competition for his research on regional inequality
in the UK; Nicholas Ratcliffe won their inaugural Architecture
Competition, designing an extension for the College Library.

Independent Learning Assignment: William Heylen was crowned the winner at the annual ILA Presentation Evening for his presentation on the complex issue of the law on joint enterprise. Other topics presented by the finalists included gene manipulation, space travel, flipping robots, financial models, the Antigone myth, and a to-do-list app.

Kids' Lit Quiz: In the South England heat of the Kids' Lit Quiz, the RGS team emerged as winners.

LAMDA: In the latest set of LAMDA public speaking and drama examinations, RGS students achieved nine distinctions and two merits.

Particularly noteworthy were Harry Dennis, Daniel Sampson and George Tench who all reached Grade 8 in the Fifth Form: an impressive achievement at this age.

TEDx: The iconic TED brand came to Guildford for the very first time as the RGS hosted TEDx Guildford, reinforcing Guildford's reputation as a dynamic centre for ideas and innovation. On the theme of high-performance mindset, the talks ranged from architecture to mental health, from computer gaming to living with disability, from cyber security to puppetry.

The annual Smoothey Art Competition produced a wide range of submissions in various media from students throughout the School. The spirit of Ronald Smoothey MBE, a former pupil and art master from the 1940s, remains very much alive in this competition as the energy, creativity and innovation and, indeed, eccentricity – which epitomised Ronald provides the inspiration for students to express themselves with imagination and no little technical skill and with no theme or media restriction. Despite an astonishingly high standard of entry, the overall winner was the impressive scrap metal sculpture of two fighters created by Darcy Elliot inspired by his grandfather's collection of scrap metal and brief introduction to the art of welding. Darcy's eye for detail and vision were very much in evidence in this original and carefully crafted piece which remained truly loyal to the spirit of flair and enterprise of Ronald Smoothey.

DRAMA

An exciting year for drama saw a diverse range of plays being staged — from traditional classics to original productions — which allowed broad participation both on and behind the stage by boys of all age groups.



The Thwarting of Baron Bolligrew



Swashbuckling heroes and fights. Medieval madness. Dastardly dragons. Evil wizards and magic spells. *The Thwarting of Baron Bolligrew* was the perfect festive production as the heroic and strait-laced knight, Sir Oblong Fitz Oblong (Max Fleming) is sent by the suitably pompous and dim Duke (Max Birtley) to slay a vicious dragon on a far-away island. Here he tangles with Baron Bolligrew (Ellis Baker), the deliciously flamboyant and crooked tyrant of the island, along with his henchman and charismatic partner in wickedness Squire Blackheart (Jack Gamble). Humour is never far below the surface with slapstick moments, sharp one-liners, pantomime-style action, clever musical interludes, fantastic costumes, imaginative staging and some great cameo roles including the savvy yet mischievous Mike Magpie (John Gray). The enchanting double act of Dr Moloch (Aradhya Soneja) and Mazeppa Magpie (Solomon Poole) as well as the emergence of the flaming-red eyes and booming voice of the dragon take the action in a more sinister, mysterious direction as the final




denouement sees the eagerly-anticipated slaying of the dragon. Sustained applause was well deserved for a talented cast and a ripping yarn which had more than delivered all the ingredients for an irresistible fairy tale.


ANOTHER COUNTRY



"You can't beat a good public school for learning to hide your true feelings", acknowledged George Reeve as he convincingly played the gay, disruptive schoolboy Guy Bennett. Set in an English public school in the 1930s, the play is by turns funny, painful and relevant as the actors powerfully captured the hierarchies, the endless quest for power and status, and the harsh cruelties and realities of public-school life. The richly developed and brilliantly defined characters sparked off each other through the slick dialogue steeped in the prejudices and attitudes of the time. Benjamin Hawken conveyed the intensity of the mischievous, scholarly communist Tommy Judd while light relief came from Wharton, played by Dominic Baker, who portrayed the comic-pathetic fag with real sensitivity. A talented cast presented the idiosyncratic characters with conviction and no little maturity; in particular, Fraser Dupuis deliciously captured the rebellious uncle, Vaughan Cunningham. The atmospheric set, lighting, sound and costume



evoked strongly the bourgeois mood of the time. Despite the era, the play still resonated as the audience reflected on a play which probes deep into the psyche of each individual and their battles with their private and public personas.



WEST SIDE STORY



The ambitious joint GHS and RGS production brought the spirit of the West End to Guildford as the students tackled one of the most famous and iconic musicals, West Side Story, originally performed on Broadway in 1957. With music by Leonard Bernstein and lyrics by Stephen Sondheim, and inspired by Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet, the production transported the audience to the Upper West Side neighbourhood in New York City in the mid-1950s. With the rivalry simmering between the two street gangs, the Jets and the Sharks, the social problems are exacerbated when Tony, a former member of the Jets and best friend of the gang leader, Riff, falls in love with Maria, the sister of Bernardo, the leader of the Sharks. The actors demonstrated remarkable maturity, nuance and confidence, none more so than Myles D'Angelo playing the star-struck lover Tony. Flamboyant costumes and staging, slick dance routines, a technically-gifted orchestra, and an instantlyrecognisable sound track - including Maria, America and I feel pretty - ensured the audience were fully immersed in the spirit of the time and humming the infectious tunes long into the night.

The quality of musicianship impressed appreciative audiences and further cemented the School's established reputation for musicianship at the very highest level.



Dido and Aeneas

This year's — now traditional — opera performance in the courtyard of the Old Building was Purcell's much-loved Dido and Aeneas. Once again, audiences were delighted and amazed in equal measure by the extraordinarily accomplished playing and singing that was produced by the RGS forces under the direction of Assistant Director of Music, Sam Orchard. The chorus work was always assured and impressive but particular mention should be made of the soloists, all of whom were outstanding. Matthew Hawkins' confident Aeneas was marked by a warm tone and a real sense of line while Matthew Sargent's Sorcerer demonstrated that he could already tackle a really demanding countertenor role with ease. Other soloists, Ridley Hymas, Yousuf Mirza and Roshan Patel were also on fine form, as were our two visiting sopranos, Bethan Thomas and Anna Leon as Dido and Belinda. The orchestra, led by Ronan Thomas, accompanied with sensitivity and style and it was good to see the RGS's new harpsichord being put through its paces by continuo player extraordinaire, Joe McHardy.





Southern Pro Musica Concert

RGS musicians had the honour of joining forces with professional orchestra *Southern Pro Musica* for a concert in the atmospheric surroundings of Holy Trinity Church. Alexander Acomb performed the first movement of the Lalo Cello Concerto in D minor with great drama and poise, setting the musical standard astonishingly high. The audience was then thrilled to hear the exciting and exotic Marimba Concerto by Rosauro performed with great humour and style by Joseph Bate who demonstrated masterful technique. The second half was opened by Alistair Baumann who gave a deeply moving performance of the entire Elgar Cello Concerto in E Minor. Finally, Callum Champion delivered the first movement of the Tchaikovsky Piano Concerto No.1 with incredible passion and energy. As always, Director of Music Peter White conducted the orchestra in this gruelling programme with great skill and sensitivity as the audience was left profoundly moved by an evening of extraordinary musicianship.





Musician of the Year

The final of the RGS Musician of the Year, the Steynor Prize, proved to be an exquisite evening of music which had the appreciative audience captivated from start to finish by the extraordinary talent and diversity of the boys. The School was honoured to welcome as adjudicator Michael Chance CBE who has established a worldwide reputation as one of the foremost exponents of the male alto voice. Michael had the unenviable task of selecting a winner and admitted that the decision was made all the harder as it was the highest standard of any school event he had had the privilege of witnessing. As he acknowledged, each of the performances demonstrated astonishing virtuosity and composure and it was humbling to hear such extraordinary talent. By the narrowest of margins, Michael awarded the Steynor Prize to a performance which had displayed poise, which was scrupulously attentive to the wide variety of markings in the piece and which had lovely overall sense of architecture: Simon King's breathtaking rendition of Chaconne by Bach-Busoni.



Music notes

The Joint RGS and GHS Schools' Chamber Choir sang Evensong in venues including Merton College Oxford and the historic Rochester Cathedral which, dating back to 604AD, is Britain's second oldest cathedral.

Thomas Jones was invited to join the National Youth Guitar Ensemble, a group comprising just 16 musicians.

Matthew Hawkins sang a solo in the recording of BBC's Morning Worship service, broadcast on BBC Radio 4 from St Mary's Church.

RGS musicians enjoyed notable success in significant numbers at the Godalming Festival. Particularly noteworthy were Samuel Jones who won both the Under 19 class and the Bach 16 and over class in the organ competition, and Callum Champion who won the Concerto Prize, making it the third year in a row for RGS pianists.

Edward Ball gained a London College of Music Performance Diploma on the harp (DipLCM) with an exceptional mark of 92% (distinction).

Ever since the RGS's foundation in 1509, the School has continually innovated and evolved to ensure our facilities provide an inspiring environment appropriate for education in the modern world. 





MAJOR SPORTS



The philosophy of *Sport for All* was very much in evidence throughout the year as over 20 teams regularly played competitive fixtures against other schools on a Saturday. Indeed, Super Tuesday saw a whole year group playing simultaneously against Portsmouth Grammar School in hockey matches.



The RGS more than holds its own

RGS rugby has continued to thrive in the very harshest of environments. South East England is saturated with some of the strongest rugby playing schools in country and yet the RGS more than holds its own in this company. The Under 16s led the way with the A team securing a succession of excellent results, including wins over Cranleigh School, Epsom College and St Paul's School. The 1st XV improved steadily as a unit, the highlight being a 29 – 17 win against NatWest Cup quarter finalists The Judd School. The 1st XV also took huge credit for two

extremely narrow losses to Cranleigh School and Epsom College, two of the country's most formidable rugby opponents. The Under 15A team impressed in the NatWest Cup, a win away from being the first team in a number of years to remain in the premier national cup competition after Christmas. Tom Rogers, Head of Rugby, commented: "Whether it is through a determined narrow loss, a convincing win or a well-earned draw the commitment of RGS boys continues to impress staff, spectators and society referees each week."



MAJOR SPORTS

SNATCHING VICTORY WITH A MATTER OF SECONDS LEFT



Hockey at the RGS picked up where it left off last season with extraordinary, and increasing, numbers of boys playing in competitive fixtures. In just nine weeks, RGS teams were involved in nearly 200 fixtures: an incredible effort from all boys and staff. Highlights of a successful term included the Under 14A team which



made it to the regional quarterfinals and the Under 16As which finished top in their pool and beat Cranleigh School in the regional quarterfinals. The 1st XI had another satisfying season, beating St George's College, Weybridge and Lancing College convincingly in the National Plate competition. On an individual note, RGS has seen seven boys selected for the England Hockey Performance Centres as well as Joshua Powell who has been selected for the Advanced Apprenticeship Sporting Excellence programme. The highlight of the season, however, was undoubtedly the 3rd XI team which played 16 and won 16 to be officially crowned the best 3rd XI team in the country. They saved their best performance for last, where they found themselves snatching victory with a matter of seconds left in their season.

RGS TEAMS FLOURISH IN THE SUNSHINE

With the backdrop of summer conditions, immaculately-prepared wickets and rolling Surrey countryside, RGS teams flourished in the sunshine. Success ran through the School right from the youngest students with the Under 12A team losing only once all term. Thomas Humphreys was the mainstay of the team scoring two centuries against Caterham School (107*) and Reed's School (150*). Other highlights of the season included the fabulous cup runs by the Under 13As and Under 14As with both teams making the finals day in their respective competitions. block fixtures against Dulwich College, Lancing College, Reed's School and St John's School were extremely pleasing with so many notable individual and team performances throughout. other centurions also deserve special mention: Abhay Gonella (105), Harrison Green (105*) and Joseph Sheldon (100*). With the ball there were both six- and fivewicket hauls for Yuvraj Gandhi (6 – 12), Alexander Tiplady (6 – 18), George Kemkers (5 – 15), Abhay Gonella (5 – 17), Charlie Kershaw (5 – 20) and Alistair Curran (5 – 51). Team of the year, however, was undoubtedly our Under 15B team which remained unbeaten all season to be ranked top Under 15B team in the country.





INDIVIDUAL HIGHLIGHTS

The extraordinary range of choices of sports available to boys at the RGS - and the specialist coaching on offer - allows them to find their passions and pursue their interests to the level which suits each individual. The impressive number of national and international successes highlights the fact that our boys effectively balance the demands of curricular and extra-curricular pursuits.

Athletics: Ben Watkins came second overall in the Surrey Schools' Combined Events Athletics Championships, achieving Personal Bests in every event in the process.

Chess: Harry Grieve won the UK Chess Challenge Terafinal to become the UK Chess Challenge Champion 2017. He was fifth seed from over 40,000 entrants and won all his games, beating the first, second and third seeds in the process to take the title. Amardip Ahluwalia was crowned Under 13 Chess Champion in the British Chess Championships and has been representing England. Alexander Golding is currently the highest-ranked player in England for his age and has recently become the 2017 English Youth Grand Prix Under 14 Champion; he also finished first in the National Junior Squad Under 14 Championships. James Golding has also been impressing and has played twice in the Main British Chess Championships.

Cross-Country: The RGS intermediate team finished third in the country in the national finals of the English Schools Cup.

Eventing: Joseph Lethbridge took the top spot in the British Eventing 90 on Maris Piper III with a dressage score of 21.

Fencing: In the Surrey Youth Fencing Championships, RGS fencers enjoyed notable success: Kenny Okoroafor won gold in the Under 16 Épée to be crowned County Champion. In the British Schools' Teams Fencing Championships, the Under 18 team secured bronze medals in the Épée. On an individual level, Leo Kamstra proudly wore national stripes in the England Fencing Under 13 Épée team that competed in Poland finishing 22nd from 2\$\square\$8 competitors. The highlight of a number of international appearances was a first place in Germany.

Football: On a competitive circuit playing some of the strongest schools in the south, the 1st XI had an encouraging season reaching the quarterfinal of the Trinity Cup and also defeating the likes of Wilson's School.

Hockey: Fraser Boulton was selected for the Wales Under 18 hockey development squad.

Ice Hockey: William Lawson, captain of the Guildford Under 15 team and also part of the South West of England side, was selected for the Under 15 England team.

Rowing: Joseph Bryant was part of the quad representing the Thames London region which won the Junior Rowing Nationals to be crowned Junior National Champions.

Sailing: Patrick Croghan was selected for the UK National Youth Sailing Squad for 29ers; as he finished third overall at the National Grand Prix Jown in Weymouth. Oliver Perkins was selected for the Great Britain Optimist sailing team.

Scuba diving: Dimitri Perricos achieved the status of Master Scuba diver, the highest level qualification for recreational scuba diving.

Shooting: In smallbore the RGS team was crowned Surrey County Champions, winning the Lord Mancroft trophy: came second in the Eley Cadet Forces' .22 Team competition; and remained unbeaten during the Lent Term, including a defeat of the formidable Wellington College. In fullbore the RGS came in the top three in all but one competition. In the main Imperial meeting Miles Horton-Baker reached the final stage of the Queen's Prize, a feat which was last achieved by one of our cadets some thirty years ago.

Skiing: The RGS Under 16 and Under 19 ski teams raced in the English Schools' finals and were placed eighth and fifth respectively in the country. The Open age group team was selected to represent England and achieved sixth best English school in the School Ski Racing British Finals.

Swimming: Max Windle was selected to represent the South East Schools Division at the National Swimming Championships.





Chess: After an outstanding season at school level all three senior teams secured victories against Wilson's School which ensured the 1st team won the Surrey County Chess Association Division One. Building on this, the RGS Under 19 team travelled to the final of the England Chess Federation School Championships. This competition, founded in 1957-58 and now in its sixtieth year, saw a total of 13D teams from 92 schools entering the competition. Sixteen teams travelled to the finals at Uppingham School where they played four games over two days. Having won their first three games, the RGS team - comprising Amardip Ahluwalia, Omeet Atara, Alexander Golding, James Golding, Harry Grieve and Luke Nelson - then beat Hampton School in the final to be crowned national chess champions and collect the impressive silver cup, first Jonated by The Sunday Times in 1957.

Quiz: Which lexicographer described the Giant's Causeway as 'worth seeing but not worth going to see'? Which Irish writer won the Nobel Prize in Literature in 1923? These were just two of the questions which the all-conquering Junior Schools Challenge quiz team answered correctly as they were crowned national Junior Schools Challenge Quiz champions. The team comprising captain Sebastian Norris, Ferdinand Al-Qassab, Joshua McGilliway and Alex Mitchell travelled the length and breadth of England in their pursuit of quiz glory. After securing the title of Regional Champions, their relentless quest continued. In the National Finals, despite trailing for most of the match against King Edward VI School, Stratford-upon-Avon, the RGS team finally built up an unassailable lead to become officially and deservedly the national champions.

The exceptional range of co-curricular activities is one of the greatest strengths of the School. Such activities are central in developing the character of the boys and in nurturing teamwork, leadership, independence and resilience.
