From the Headmaster

The word enterprise originated in the 1400s and was derived from the old French word *entreprendre* meaning *to undertake* but more specifically, with its etymological origins of capturing and seizing, it became associated with ventures of a particularly bold or ambitious nature. It is therefore unsurprising that *Enterprise* is a name frequently given to military ships or spacecraft (including the fictitious *Starship Enterprise* of *Star Trek*), wholly suitable for vessels designed to navigate stormy and turbulent seas or for a craft venturing into the unknown where an element of risk is unavoidable.

This all seems particularly apt as I reflect on the last 18 months; indeed, if tasked with renaming the School, the *RGS Enterprise* would seem a fitting suggestion!
